Welcome to Bulletin 3. This month, I will begin by using a quote from the sporting arena:

'You are only as good as your last game'.

What does the quote actually mean? What has this got to do with our Academies? Bear with me... basically, the sporting quote refers to someone's sporting performance, and asks how a person or team has faired in their most recent match. Of course, in simple terms, that could have been a good performance or perhaps a bad one.

It is quite likely that people who witnessed that sporting performance will draw a conclusion about that person or team and then judge them and possibly their reputation.

In this day and age, it is quite possible that the judgement or opinion, either good or bad, will end up being shared on the internet in the form of a post on social media. From here, it is then that the wider world can see the post and add comments or opinions on a performance that perhaps they didn't even see.

Similarly, it is also common place for our Academies to experience such judgements and comments. Some of these are also being posted online. Just like the example of the sports person or team, all stakeholders will have an opinion about our performance, which is of course entirely acceptable. Comments or concerns that are shared directly with us when using the appropriate channels can be addressed quickly. It is far easier for us all to work in partnership, and for all those concerned, it is always our aim to deal with issues fairly, appropriately and effectively. Understandably, our Aspiration, Respect and Kindness (ARK) values are there for everyone to follow.




the World. The day started early and it took us 1 hour and 30 minutes to get to the capital city. We travelled on a coach, which was extremely exciting.

Each class, from reception to Year 6, has elected a council member who will lead the Academies to become more eco-friendly. They will devise our Eco-code and meet regularly to launch Eco-projects for both academies. 
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Teaching and Learning at Raleigh and Admirals

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
An apology to Jack...


