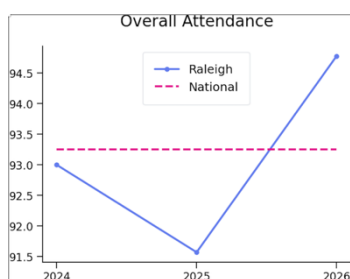

A Principal's view – Thank you !

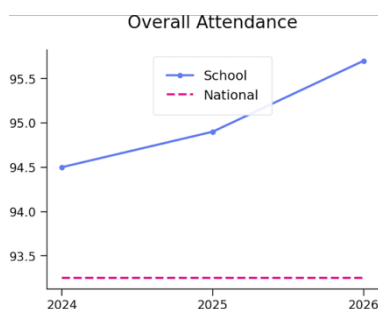

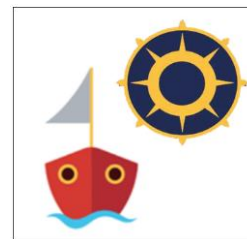
to see. Every day in school counts, and your commitment to ensuring that children arrive on time, ready to learn, has played a vital role in supporting their progress and success. Admirals ➡

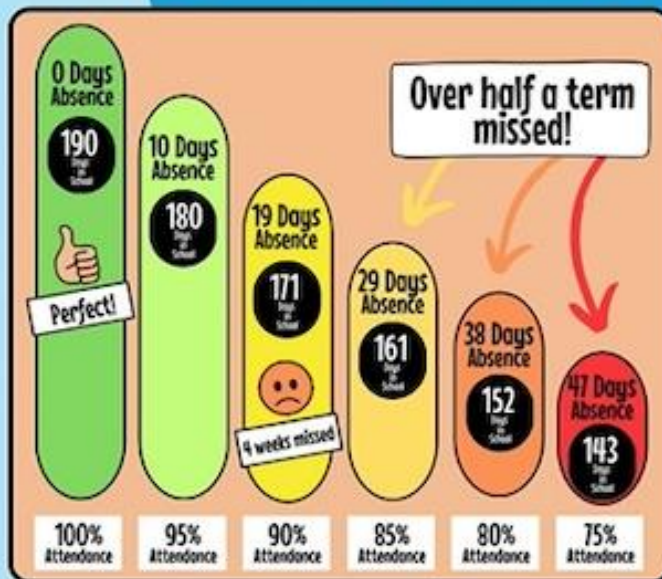

Tips for Supporting Good Attendance...

Set a regular routine

A consistent bedtime and morning routine helps children feel ready for school and reduces last-minute stress.

Aim for every day

Try to make school attendance the default. Only keep your child off if they are genuinely unwell.

Plan appointments carefully

Where possible, book medical or dental appointments outside school hours so your child doesn't miss lessons.

Talk positively about school

Ask about your child's day and celebrate the little things they enjoy. Your positivity helps them look forward to school.

Stay in touch

When a child is struggling, early communication with the school helps everyone find solutions and makes things easier for the child.

Prepare the night before

Pack bags, lay out uniforms and check homework in the evening to make mornings smoother and less stressful.

Reception – Stories from the past

Reception have loved exploring their final learning theme of the year, 'Stories from the Past'. Throughout the half term, the children have taken part in a range of exciting experiences that have helped bring their learning to life and deepen their understanding. Some of our highlights have included becoming storytelling detectives and investigating fairy tale crime scenes, re-enacting *Prometheus and the Fire* and sculpting our own Greek Gods while exploring Greek myths, as well as toasting marshmallows around a 'campfire' as we discovered West African folktales like *Anansi the Spider*.



Our growing knowledge of stories from around the world and throughout history, combined with the love of books we have developed across Reception, has inspired us in so many ways. We have written our own stories, created puppet shows, performed



for one another, and let our imaginations flourish. As we reach the end of our Reception journey, we have also enjoyed retelling the story of our year together, reflecting on all the wonderful experiences, friendships, and learning that have made this such a special year. We are certainly amazing storytellers in the making, and we are excited to continue our stories in Year 1.



Year 1 – Saving our World

This term, Year 1 has been learning about how we can help to save our world by reducing waste, recycling and caring for our environment.

The children explored different types of pollution and discussed how pollution can affect people, animals and habitats. They also took part in a litter pick around the school grounds, helping to keep our environment clean while learning that everyone can play a part in protecting our planet.



As part of our learning, the children worked together to create a fantastic recycling wall. They carefully painted it with bright colours and important messages to raise awareness about the importance of recycling and looking after our planet. The finished display reminds

everyone in our school that even small actions can make a big difference.

We have also explored simple ways to help the environment, such as using the correct recycling bins, saving water, turning off lights when they are not needed and reusing everyday items wherever possible.

We are incredibly proud of the enthusiasm and creativity Year 1 has shown throughout this topic. Well done, Year 1, for helping to make our school a greener place!



Year 2 - Science

This half term, Year 2 enjoyed an exciting visit to Explorazone in Norwich. Throughout the day, the children explored three interactive rooms packed with opportunities to investigate, experiment and learn through play. They took part in a range of hands-on activities that brought chemistry, physics, astronomy and the human body to life, helping to develop their scientific understanding in an engaging and memorable way. The excitement continued in the spectacular Lights Room, where the children experienced the incredible space-time tunnel, navigated the tricky mirror maze, challenged themselves in the tilted room and tested their skills in the laser maze. It was a fantastic day of exploration, discovery and fun, creating wonderful memories for both the children and the adults.



Year 3 – Geography, History & Maths

Year 3 have enjoyed a fantastic Summer Term filled with exciting learning opportunities and memorable experiences. One of the highlights of the term was our educational visit to the Great River Ouse in Ely. The children returned to school full of enthusiasm, eager to share the fascinating facts and experiences they had discovered throughout the day.



During the visit, the children took part in a range of hands-on activities, including river dipping, conducting a river survey, exploring the river on a guided walk, and learning about traditional eel fishing. They thoroughly enjoyed identifying river wildlife and developed their understanding of the local environment while learning new vocabulary such as *moorings* and *marina*.



It has been wonderful to see how much of this learning has stayed with the children, with many continuing to discuss their experiences back in the classroom. Several children even described the trip as “the best ever”, which is a testament to how much they enjoyed it.

The day also included a picnic in the park and an opportunity to create some beautiful drawings of Ely Cathedral. Throughout the visit, the children were



outstanding ambassadors for the academy, demonstrating our core values of aspiration, respect and kindness. Their excellent behaviour and impeccable manners were noticed and praised by members of the public on several occasions, and we are incredibly proud of them.



Year 4 – Design Technology (DT)

Year 4 enjoyed a fantastic Design Technology (DT) Day, where we learnt all about apples before using them to make our very own apple crumbles!



We began the day by discovering where apples are grown and learnt that many different varieties are produced in orchards across the UK. We explored the seasonality of apples and compared a range of varieties before carrying out a taste test of Braeburn and Royal Gala apples to decide which we preferred.



During the practical 'make' section of the day, the children learnt how to safely peel, chop and remove the core from apples before having a go themselves. Some of us found these new skills quite challenging, but we persevered and showed our school value of kindness by helping and encouraging our friends.



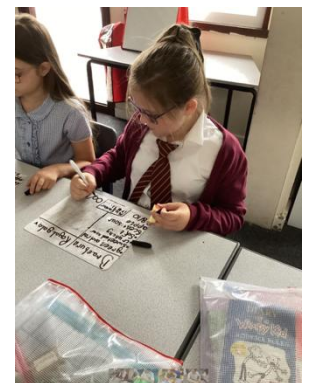
Once the apples were prepared, we moved on to making the crumble topping using flour, butter and sugar. The delicious smell of baking apple crumbles soon filled the corridors as they cooked in the oven over lunchtime! After lunch, the moment we had been waiting for finally arrived – tasting our creations. Most of us thoroughly

enjoyed our crumbles, and we were especially proud of those children who had a try, even if they thought they might not like it.



To finish the day, we evaluated our apple crumbles and discussed what had gone well, as well as what we might do differently next time. It was a fun-filled day of learning, teamwork and delicious results!

Year 5 Geography – Local Study

As part of the Year 5 Local Study work, we discussed the traffic on Admirals Way and decided to do a survey to see just how busy it actually is. After planning what data we were going to collect, we headed out and started tallying immediately. We were all amazed at how many cars drove down the road but were disappointed not to see



any lorries or buses during the time of our data collection. After graphing the data, we discussed if the half hour survey we carried out reflected the general amount of traffic on Admirals Way. The children realised that if we were to carry out the survey at different times of the day and on different days of the week, our results would probably be very different.

BMX & Skateboarding Workshops

The sun was shining brightly for our exciting Skateboarding and BMXing workshop with Mike and Danny from BMX Academy. The children loved having a go, learning new tricks and cheering one another on throughout the session. There were plenty of smiles as they practised balance, control and confidence. Most importantly, they discovered how resilience helps when a challenge feels tricky, and how rewarding it can be to keep trying.



Year 6 – Busy Busy

As we approach the end of a very busy term, our year 6 pupils have had a week of adventure and fun to mark the end of their primary school years. Forty pupils attended the residential trip at Thorpe



Woodlands

where the children were challenged to take on a range of activities including caving, ziplining, tree-trekking, archery, canoeing and many more. For some, they breezed through but for others their resilience and fears were tested.



Both the team at Thorpe Woodlands and the accompanying staff were blown away by the children's kindness towards one another, courage and open-mindedness when approaching some of the more challenging sessions.



For those that did not attend, the fun was not missed. The remaining children took part in cooking, drumming, art and PE whilst also having Outdoor Explore deliver similar sessions to that of a residential on the school field. Whilst they were very much missed, we were glad they that they had a great time too.



Uniform Reminder for the Autumn term '26

Taken from the Set Uniform list available on our website

At Raleigh Infant Academy children are able to wear:

- Blue Raleigh sweater or cardigan
- White or blue polo shirt
- Dark grey trousers, shorts and skirts
- Blue checked summer dresses



At Admirals Academy children are able to wear:

- Maroon Admirals sweater or cardigan
- White shirt
- Maroon & gold Admirals tie
- Dark grey trousers, shorts and skirts
- Blue checked summer dresses

Footwear

- Plain black shoes that are suitable for play – we allow plain black trainers without heavy design. We also allow plain non-heeled boots but would suggest that these be light weight so not to impede the children running.
- Sandals, heeled, and open-toed footwear are not safe for school and therefore, we would ask this to be replaced.



If the warm weather continues through to September, additional Summer Attire will be useful to keep the children cool.

- A hat within the second half of summer term, preferably one that covers the neck.
- Children will be asked to stay in the shade without a hat.

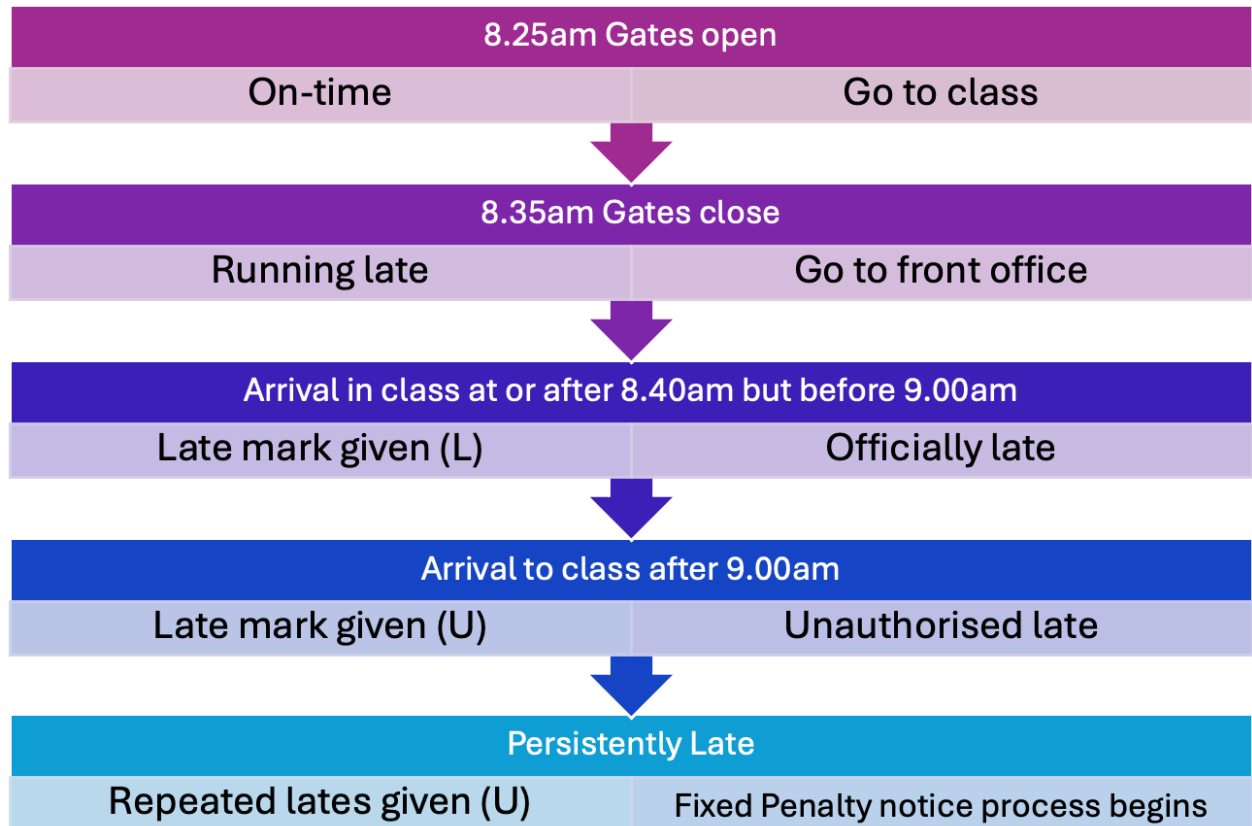

Our 'Late to School' Flowchart



We would like to clarify our morning start procedures to ensure all families understand how lateness is recorded and why punctuality is so important.

School gates open at **8:25am**. Children arriving during this time are considered on time and should go straight to class. Gates close promptly at **8:35am**. Any child arriving after this time is classed as running late and must report to the front office to be signed in.

If a child arrives in class at or after **8:40am but before 9:00am**, they will receive a late mark (L). This is recorded as officially late. While this may seem like a short delay, valuable learning takes place at the start of each day, and arriving late can disrupt both your child's learning and that of others.

If a child arrives **after 9:00am**, this is recorded as an unauthorised late mark (L). This is a more serious mark and is recorded as absence for the session. Where children are persistently late and receive repeated (L) marks, the fixed penalty notice process may begin in line with national guidance.

We appreciate your support in ensuring children arrive on time each day, ready to learn and make the most of every lesson.
